


Goodbye to 2024

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FALL COLORS IN FLORIDA'S NATURAL LANDSCAPE

Florida's fall colors may be subtle, but our native trees and shrubs still put on a seasonal show. Whether you're exploring wooded trails, wetland edges, parks, or your own neighborhood, you can catch glimpses of autumn's hues. With the right space, you might even consider planting one in your yard to enjoy the colors while benefiting local wildlife.





WHY DO LEAVES CHANGE COLORS?

The bright green of leaves comes from chlorophyll, which helps plants turn sunlight into energy through photosynthesis. As fall arrives and days grow shorter, chlorophyll production slows, allowing the reds, yellows, and purples from other pigments to emerge. The intensity and duration of these colors depend on factors like temperature and moisture.

Here in Florida, with our longer days and warmer nights, the peak fall colors arrive later and are often more subtle than those up north.

FAREWELL TO AN ERA

SS UNITED STATES

In 1962 I visited St. Thomas, the Virgin Islands. One of the highlights of the trip was standing on a mountaintop looking down into the bay watching the sleek SS United States sail into port. Then one of the most successful ocean-crossing vessels, it gave me great pride to see it side by side with the SS France.



What a great memory.

Today the once proud ship is on a voyage down south, where it will be sunk to served as an artificial reef off the Florida Gulf Coast. City commissioners in Okaloosa County, Florida, have approved a \$10.1 million plan to relocate the ocean liner and sink it off the coast of Destin-Fort Walton Beach. The plan includes building a \$1 million seaside museum chronicling the cruise liner's history.

Captain Joseph Farrell -- who created the current record-holder for the world's largest



artificial reef – addressed details about the mission, "This is the best ending for the ship. Serving as an artificial reef, means the United States will live on to nurture generations of marine life," he said.

Farrell says crews will check the tides for the best time to begin its journey. He says the SS (steam ship) United States will have to move away from the dock at high tide. It will then need to go under the Walt

Whitman Bridge during low tide. And so the we will soon bid a fond farewell to this evocative vessel and the era when overseas transport meant a shipboard journey.

Wildlife Inc., has been saving wildlife through rehabilitation and education since 1988.
