The Bear Facts

Our Solivita Bear continues to dominate the wildlife chatter here in Solvita. While some panic and want the bear immediately removed, others understand that bears are part of life in Central Florida and enjoy his presence --- from afar.

One fact must be understood from the onset: Black bears are native to Central Florida and a natural part of everyday life. FWC will not automatically consider the presence of a bear to be am emergency. Inconvenience is not considered by them to be grounds for action.

Everyone of us has chosen to live here, on the boundary of the Florida Wildlife Corridor, where bears will come and go. They only destroy a bear when absolutely necessary. And they will only be removed in a case of documented aggression. The Florida Black Bear is part of the natural environment of Central Florida. Although potentially dangerous, they have a shy disposition that causes them to avoid and flee from humans. Learning and embracing a few easy to use safety tips will usually keep them from becoming a nuisance.



Their initial and major response is to educate residents as to how to live safely with bears.

Your HOA is doing everything reasonably possible to assure the safety of all residents from this, and any future bear. Please help spread the word to uninformed residents that prevention is, as always, the best medicine.

DID YOU KNOW

Did you know that Spanish Moss, found commonly on trees and plants in Florida, is neither Spanish nor moss? It is a bromeliad — a perennial herb in the pineapple family. Most bromeliads, Including Spanish Moss, are epiphytes, which grow on other plants, but do not rely on them for nutrients. Epiphytes take their nutrients from the air and debris that collects on the plant.

Spanish Moss is a native plant found throughout North America, therefore not considered an invasive species. In most circumstances, Spanish Moss does not harm other organisms in its ecosystem and provides food and homes for other organisms.







THE BEAR FACTS

In that effort he spoke to Paige Parks, West Central Area Bear Biologist at Florida Wildlife Commission. Paige will be meeting with a group of HOA Board Members and Rudy to inform them regarding the realities of life in Florida involving bears, and the best methods of ensuring community safety.

We have also invited Lori Lindsay, FWC Bear Contractor, to speak to the community. These two women have more than 18 years of combined hands-on experience in dealing with bears in Florida. Please tell your friends - and everyone on Next Door - that attendance at the bear presentation should be mandatory for anyone concerned about safety and security in Solivita.
